- Red-Yellow Cubed™ tulip blend engulfs the parking lot area in fiery hues
- Starry Night™ daffodil blend pairs perfectly with the nearby Vital Signs™ tulip blend bringing cheery red and soft white blooms to the Fischer Visitor Center
- Compote Cherie™ hyacinth blend paints the Carol & Bruce Bell Children's Garden with pastel pinks, blues, and purples

Bulbs aren't the only thing taking center stage this spring! Our collection of over 100 magnolias also blooms around the same time as our spring bulb display, with peak bloom lasting through the first two weeks of May. Our thousands of spring flowering perennials, shrubs, and other trees will be flourishing too! **Peak bloom is anticipated mid-May through the end of the month.**
